



Cascadia Water Trail Campsites



Kopachuck State Park *The South Sound Area*

The name “Kopachuck” originates from the Chinook language. “Kopa” means “at” and “chuck” means “water.” The park has an underwater park and a wooded forest that includes a lush mix of fir, ferns, and salal.

Natural History.

Take the time to visit Cutts Island, a Marine State Park that is approximately a 20-minute paddle from Kopachuck. Also known as Deadman’s Island, local lore paints the island as an Indian burial ground. It is said that the dead were put in hollowed-out log canoes, which were then placed in the forks of trees so they would be closed to heaven.
