



## Cascadia Water Trail Campsites

### Lummi Island *The North Sound Area*

There are many Department of Natural Resources (DNR) beaches along the east side of this steep-banked island. Most are accessible by boat only. At places on the south end of Lummi the bluffs rise 1,500 feet from the water. The Cascadia Marine Trail campsite is located in the most southerly of three coves on DNR's 2,125 foot shoreline, just under two miles from the island's southern tip.

#### *Natural History.*

This island was originally called Skallaham by Lummi Indians (thought to have had housing nearby used for hunting lodges). It was called Isla de Pacheco by Spanish explorers Galiano and Valdex, and Lummi by the U.S. Geodetic Survey in 1853. The name is thought to refer to luminara, great bonfires seen by the Spaniards as they arrived.
